## CONNECT

**CONNECT** the ways authors and illustrators communicate. Authors use vocabulary, word patterns, repetition, rhyme, punctuation, and colourful written descriptions to tell stories. Illustrators use lines, shapes, visual patterns, repetition, proportion, emphasis, and colours to communicate. Experiment with ways that illustrations and words both communicate ideas.



**CREATE** sketches of Harold, Moose, and Porcupine using basic lines, shapes, and a dash of colour. Draw them as playful characters who are excited and eager. Explore how simple changes, like the curve of a smile, frown, or eyebrow, can transform a face from curious to furious.

**RESPOND** to creativity's magical opportunities. Harold used his purple crayon to put what he imagined into action: a path to follow, a mountain to climb, and pies to eat. Imagine that anything you draw could become real.
